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After an apostolic visitation into conflicts in the Memphis diocese, including the reassignment of a large percentage of its priests, <u>Bishop Martin Holley has been</u> removed by Pope Francis.

As the bishops' synod on young people enters its final week, voting on the final document is scheduled for Saturday. In other synod news:

- Film director <u>Martin Scorsese and the pope talked about how to bridge the</u> <u>generations</u> at an event sponsored by Loyola Press celebrating the publication of its book, *Sharing the Wisdom of Time.*
- "Listening" is a buzzword at the synod, but Fr. Tom Reese sees <u>three different</u> <u>kinds of listening</u> going on there. And Phyllis Zagano asks, "<u>Who is listening to</u> whom?" at the synod.
- At yesterday's press conference, participants said the final <u>document needs to</u> reflect the concerns of all young people, not just those in the West.

<u>Washington D.C. joins</u> a growing number of states whose attorneys general have opened investigations into clergy sex abuse.

The U.S. bishops announced they will begin 2019 with a <u>spiritual retreat at</u> <u>Mundelein Seminary outside Chicago</u>—this, in response to a delegation of bishops' meeting with Pope Francis in September. Chicago in January—sounds like penance to me.

In Washington state, the bishops have endorsed a gun control ballot initiative.

Michael Sean Winters says in the midterm elections, <u>issues don't matter because the</u> <u>president is running on fear</u>. Early voting has begun in many states.
