But the two documents also share an approach that emphasizes addressing environmental and social problems together. As Francis put it, "Everything is connected."

Founded by an American Ursuline sister and seven Chilean women, **[Casa Ursulina is grounded in friendship and solidarity among women](#)**. The programs at the center in Chillán, Chile, not only teach skills that local women can use to earn some extra money, but also foster mental health. Local psychologists and social workers even prescribe joining Casa Ursulina to their depressed patients.
