From Bay Area, volunteers head to El Paso: 'Time for Catholics to be Catholic.' Notices in the bulletins of St. Ignatius and St. Agnes in San Francisco brought in parishioners wanting to help refugees on the border, in a yet-unnamed but ongoing project. Members of the first team unpack their experiences in July for NCR, and the August team faced a traumatic event: **Annunciation House volunteers 'on lockdown' during El Paso massacre.**

Meanwhile, in Nogales, Mexico, **while migrants wait on the border, sisters in Mexico welcome them daily to the 'dining room'** that's a 10-minute walk south of the Mariposa Border Crossing into the United States.
