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In openly criticizing Brazil's president, 152 bishops spur anger, controversy

. The "Letter to the People of God," from a group of progressive bishops, has generated strong reactions both from wider society and within the church including criticism from fellow bishops and a petition of support signed by some 1,500 priests. The controversy reflects the sharp polarization of Brazilian society that has only intensified since the 2018 election of President Jair Bolsonaro.
